PAUL KUENNING'S FEBRUARY REPORT TO RESIDENTS

Paul Kuenning met with Prairie Village residents at 10:00 A.M. on Thursday, February 25, 2020, initially describing his recent vacation trip to Hawaii, which he and his wife were visiting for the first time.

He advised that he has been working with contractor Scott Ehlert on the construction of the new Prairie Village Community Center, indicating that the project continues to go well, with a current occupancy date projected to be sometime this September. Information regarding the kitchen appliances has been given to Sue Stanley and her kitchen team. He noted that providing electricity for the various needs of the building, including WiFi, door security, etc., is proving to be complicated as each has different electricity requirements.

He also provided a report on the status of the resolution of the IJ problems resulting from the recent survey at Fairhaven. He indicated that the fine amounts to a little over \$10,000. He stated that he was happy to note that the level of severity was not as serious or drastic as the original citation indicated. He further noted that although the 5-star rating will be reduced, the citation had arisen as a result of documentation failings, and the level of care provided was never compromised.

Paul then introduced David Gackstatter who has been hired to fill the vacancy being caused by Linda Peterson's retirement. David and his wife have a newborn son who was born on this past January 3rd, and a three-year-old daughter, and they reside in Janesville. David attended Parker High School in Janesville and Beloit College, and has been employed in Rockford, Illinois, for the past eight years. He spoke at length regarding the complexity of Medicare/Medicaid issues.

Tim Probst then provided an update on the status of proposed construction in Prairie Village, noting that Wayne and Mary Ellen DeLoach are slowly moving in from St. Croix Falls, Wisconsin. Tim also indicated that 909 Acorn Ridge, previously vacated by Dolores Piehl, has been spoken for and will be occupied later in the week.

Both Tim and Paul indicated that any construction of any new duplexes will be done on the upper eyebrow remaining at the south end of Burr Oak Trail. Tim advised that one unit in that eyebrow will be occupied by a couple from the state of Maine who found Fairhaven online, came for a visit, and loved it. Paul did note that they would also prefer to include construction of a duplex on Acorn Ridge immediately south of the Kapela's in the near future. He indicated that concern about water problems on the south end of Acorn Ridge may result in those units being built without basements.

Regarding apartment vacancies at Fairhaven, Tim indicated that one individual would be moving in that week. He advised that there are currently 98 apartments: 20 are two-bedroom apartments; 60 are one-bedroom apartments, and 18 are efficiencies. He said that at this time that seems to be a good balance.

And, finally, Paul advised that Jesse is leaving again, as he has accepted employment elsewhere. Paul indicated that staffing in all areas continues to be a challenge, especially with CNAs.

PRAIRIE VILLAGE LIBRARY UPDATE

As Prairie Village residents, we also have access to the libraries at Fairhaven. There's a Little Free Library whose location varies from month to month (see the Fairhaven newsletter's Resident Council update each month for where to find it). We also can use the Jess Norenberg Library, located on the Lower Level at Fairhaven. Our neighbor Lori Stoneking is its librarian. Among its many holdings, there's a good number of large print books (increasingly helpful to many of us). If you've not, you may want to check out those two other libraries but don't forget our own!

More Library history: The very sturdy, tall bookcase in our current location was built by Ron Bergsten for their Palmyra home and has been on loan to our Library. Once we relocate, it will be going to their daughter where, based on its solid construction, it will almost certainly continue to provide years of service to the family, in the Reedsburg United Methodist Church parsonage.

Issue: During the winter some Prairie Village residents have noticed condensation on certain windows in their home and have had to wipe up excessive moisture.

Background: The reason this is happening in some homes is because you have too much water vapor (invisible moisture) in the air in your home. When the outside temperatures drop during winter months, eventually the inside surface of your window also gets cold. Once this happens, your window acts like a glass of iced tea in the summer. Have you ever noticed how moisture condenses on the outside of an iced tea glass? The same thing is happening to your windows during the winter when outside temperatures drop and get colder.

Homes like yours are built very “tight” these days. Increased energy efficient homes are required by current Building Codes. “Tightening” the home is done to minimize outside air infiltration and keep the inside air warmer – thus reducing your heating bill. Keep in mind that outside air is “drier” than inside air. As a result, when outside air infiltrates your Prairie Village home, it actually *lowers* the amount of moisture in the air inside your home. At the same time, we all increase the amount of invisible water vapor (increased relative humidity) during our everyday living. Cooking, baking, breathing, washing dishes, plants -- even water evaporation from the toilet increases moisture in your home.

Try any, or all, of the following steps and see what happens:

1. Run a dehumidifier. Yes, even during the winter.
2. Run your furnace fan continuously during the winter.
3. Briefly open your windows/doors every day to allow for drier outside air to come in and mix with the more humid inside air.
4. Run your bathroom and kitchen exhaust fans more often.
5. AND, continue to wipe the moisture/water off your windows if, and when, necessary.

Hint: It's important that you dispose of any paper towels used to wipe moisture/water immediately in a trash can in your garage. Don't put them in a trash can inside the house because you don't want that water-soaked paper towel to evaporate moisture back into the inside air. If you use a cloth towel, immediately dry it in your clothing dryer.

We hope this helps. Thanks to Rusty Kapela, retired weatherman/meteorologist and to Home Lumber, our window provider, for helping provide this information.
