#### PAUL KUENNING'S MARCH REPORT TO RESIDENTS

Paul Kuenning met with Prairie Village residents at 10:00 A.M. on Tuesday, March 10, 2020. Paul was accompanied by Karen Boyle, Director of Nursing, and they spoke at length about recent concerns and procedures being put in place for dealing with the coronavirus epidemic. They indicated that they had already had three staff meetings to educate the staff about the situation. Karen indicated that the coronavirus is a respiratory condition a little more tenacious than SARS, which is also a coronavirus. She indicated that individuals with underlying medical conditions are the only ones who need to worry. [Editor's Note: recent news reports would indicate that health experts are now indicating that people of all ages may be at risk of contracting the virus.] She noted that the virus is being spread person to person, and no other species of animal is involved in the transmission of the virus. She stressed the importance of staying home if you don't feel well, adding that symptoms related to infection by the virus included cough, fever, and shortness of breath. She added, however, that there are many different diseases that present with these symptoms. Residents were advised to contact their primary care physicians in the case of any illness, whether potentially related to the virus or not.

Karen indicated that the average age of Fairhaven residents is 89 years. They have implemented a sign-up sheet for visitors, and were specifically inquiring if visitors had recently visited the state of Washington. She noted that the CDC was recommending the use of sign-up sheets in order that transmission of the illness could be tracked should a case appear at Fairhaven.

She also emphasized the importance of frequent hand-washing and of coughing into your elbow, adding that Fairhaven already has in place extensive procedures for dealing with this situation.

Paul indicated that choir and other activities would continue as usual for the time being, adding that if there were an outbreak here, or even as close as Janesville, that might change.

It was suggested that the We Care Team could be a big help in getting groceries delivered, etc.

[Editor's Note: Please note that with the rapid release of information during subsequent days, some of the information in this report was subject to change. For instance, it was only the next day that Fairhaven residents were given further limitations of movement, and the day after that, Thursday, March 12th, when Fairhaven went into a total lockdown.]

Finally, Karen noted that they felt very fortunate that there had been no problem with typical influenza this year.

Paul also spoke about the change in Fairhaven's rating, noting that although the rating has dropped to 4-star, they are still 5-star for staffing and quality care. The original overall 5-star rating had been impacted only by issues related to documentation, rather than the care itself.

He advised that plans were underway to organize a tour of our Community Center. And he spoke briefly about staffing, reporting that Linda Peterson would be going on vacation at the end of March, so David Gackstatter would be graduating to a desk from his work table. He also noted that Gayle Beck is also retiring and that Dawn Rocha will be taking over Gayle's duties. And he advised that Chris Fritzche has given his notice. Although Chris hasn't given a specific date, he will be leaving Fairhaven to go into private business.

Kathy Ross announced that Jerry Hancock would be speaking on criminal justice reform in Fellowship Hall at Fairhaven at 10:30 on Thursday morning, and she encouraged anyone who might be interested to attend.
