Furnace filters are available just inside the first set of doors at the front door of the Community Center.

NOTE FROM PAUL KUENNING

The Good News: the Moderna Covid-19 vaccine is scheduled to be given on February 12 in Fellowship Hall. We will be getting a schedule out prior to that date to let you know a time to start arriving. Please, if you have not already done so, complete the Walgreens form and return it to the reception desk. I have also been hearing residents are finding additional places the vaccines are being given. If you have signed up at Fairhaven and are going to another place to receive it earlier, please let us know to remove you from our vaccine list.

When the vaccine was given on January 12 on the main campus, over 200 were vaccinated. 97% of residents and 60% of staff accepted the vaccine. Fairhaven has not made the vaccine mandatory for staff at this time, and we are hoping more staff will come to accept the vaccine as time goes on. We are expecting to vaccinate over 300 on the February 12 date.

More Good News: we have not had Covid in the Fairhaven skilled floors since December 2. YES!!!!

We continue to test staff twice weekly and monitor the positivity rate in the County which is still in outbreak status at 12.5%. We are hoping with the return of the students and classes again being offered we will not see a resurgence.

The Good News: once the positivity rate goes below 10% we will plan to open the new community center for use. We will, however, have to monitor the new variants of the virus to determine if this may be done. With the opening, social distancing and masking and limiting group size to 10 will still be required. If you use the community center at this time it will be at your own understanding of the risk and potential exposure, even with the vaccine.

We welcome new residents: Mike & Kathy Harenza (836 Acorn Ridge), Sandy Friedl (730 Burr Oak Trail), and Lee and Edie Gilbertson (726 Burr Oak Trail). We continue to have strong interest in new buildings and are currently planning for two new buildings in 2021.

The concerning news: at the beginning of Covid we had a total staff of 240, currently we have a staff base of 180. COVID-19 has prompted retirement and/or job changes due to health concerns. Stimulus and unemployment changes, although needed, have not been helpful in attracting new staff, and has just accelerated the staffing shortage in nursing.

At this time, we are not planning to have staff available to clean Prairie Village units and are recommending contacting Cloute in Fort Atkinson, if cleaning services are needed.

Our third-floor skilled nursing floor is closed and we are currently only using 2nd floor with a total occupancy of 35. We have just recently begun to take new admissions. Our apartments are down 25 units, and assisted living is down 8. We continue to monitor our revenues and expenses very carefully at this time, and know that recovery will be a slow process as we navigate a new future. Staffing has been modified where needed, and admissions slowed to make sure we have necessary coverage for the level of care required.

The Know box is used by local emergency responders to gain access to individual homes when there is an emergency. As some residents may recall, several years ago, a resident who was experiencing a medical emergency was responsible for repairs to the door of his home when emergency responders had to break in, because the doors were locked. In order to avoid that damage, with its ensuing financial cost, a box may be purchased, hung over the front door, and secured with screws on the interior back. Once in place, the local Fire Department manager comes out, places the home key in the box, and locks it with the key the emergency responders have. The cost is \$187 (subject to change). If you are interested in ordering one of these boxes, please email Beth Johnson or Paul Kuenning, and we will coordinate the ordering of each one.
