PAUL KUENNING'S JULY REPORT TO RESIDENTS

Paul met with Prairie Village residents at 10:00 A.M. on Tuesday, July 19th. Initially, he spoke of continuing staffing problems post COVID.

And he briefly commented on renovations on the 3rd and 4th floors at Fairhaven, noting that bidding for the project has increased by one million dollars, adding that the supply chain is still an issue. He advised that the Board approved going ahead with the 3rd and 4th floor projects, noting that one will be renovation and the other will be remodeling. Once the project is completed, the 3rd floor will have 13 units, and the 4th floor will have 23 one-bedroom units.

He also advised that the two Filipino nurses are still on staff, advising that that program has been expanded, and Fairhaven has requested ten additional Filipino nurses.

PAUL KUENNING'S JULY REPORT TO RESIDENTS, continued

Paul advised that scholarships are available to UW-W students, provided that they make a commitment to work at Fairhaven for two years. Students in the nursing program find that option attractive.

He indicated that in addition to the staff problems related to COVID, there are several long-term employees who are retiring. He noted that skilled care is limited to twenty patients because of staffing issues.

Regarding Prairie Village, Paul said that when it comes to marketing, the focus has been on making sure units that have come open get occupied shortly.

He also reported that a portion of the trail behind the Rigert residence is low, and the City intends to remove and replace that section. In addition, the City will seal the asphalt on the trail. And, regarding the gazebo, Paul advised that the City intends to remove it and replace it with benches. Several residents expressed concern about removing the gazebo as many people who are walking on the trail stop there to sit in the shade.

Paul said that moles are now beginning to be a problem, and research is being done to find out the best way to deal with them.

Residents spoke appreciatively of the fact that there has been no problem with the Canadian geese this year.

Concern was expressed about the coffeemaker having been inoperable for the recent two weeks. Apparently, the problem with the unit had been caused by hard water. Paul indicated that he believed that there is a water softener in the building.

Hans Hahn commented that the garden looks great again this year and is producing well. Gardeners are placing excess produce on the bench beside the garden, and Prairie Village residents are welcome to help themselves to any of that produce if they so desire.

Tim Probst spoke briefly, noting that Prairie Village will have 4 homes open up in the next month or so. He asked that residents serve as spokespersons for Prairie Village and encourage others to move here.

I am still collecting egg cartons. Leave on porch if I am not home.

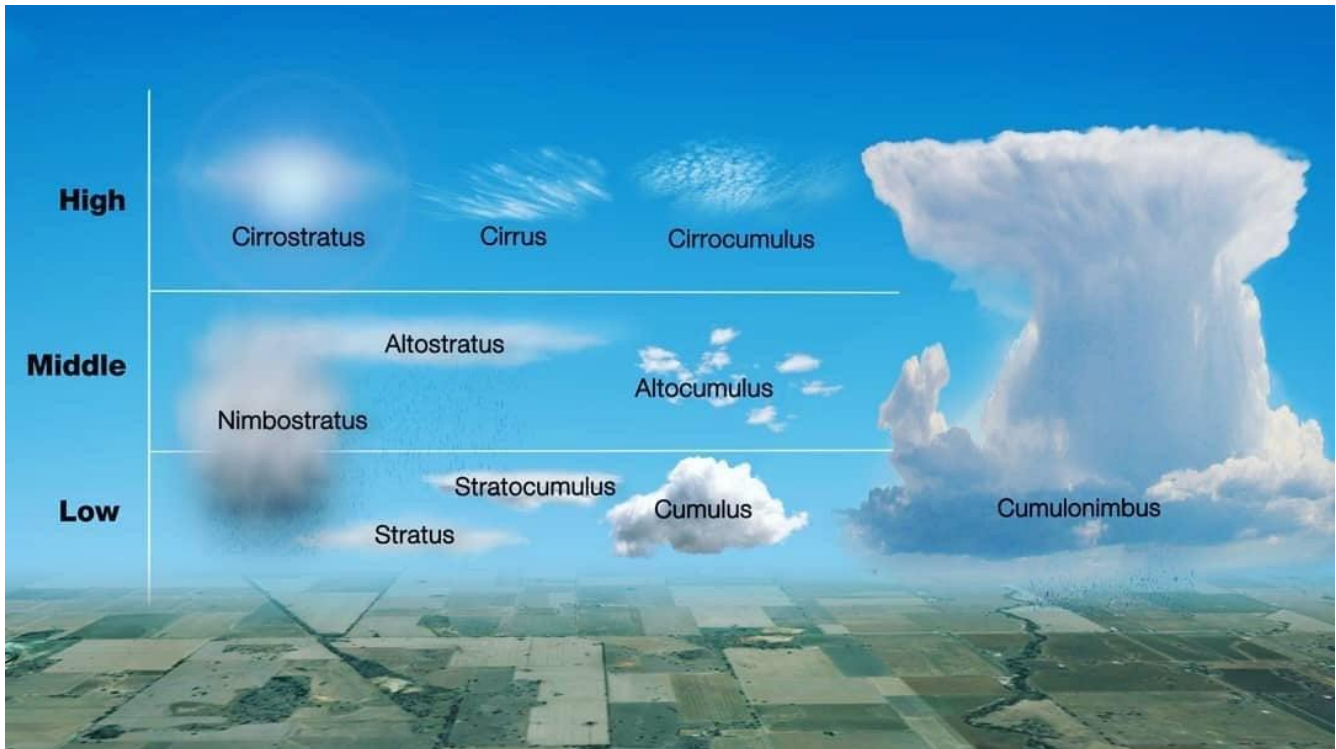
Did You Know?....Now You Know!

Clouds...Clouds...Clouds!!!

There are many different kinds of clouds and no one would be expected to remember the name of all of them! So don't feel bad! Let's review some of the basic types of clouds...that will serve as a good starting point.

Generally, there are 4 basic classes of clouds: 1) low-level, 2) middle-level, 3) high-level, and 4) thunderstorms. The first three classes are determined by the altitude of the base of the cloud above ground level). A thunderstorm can consist of cloud types from each of the first three classes.



- 1) Low-level (bases below 7000 ft above ground level (AGL):
 - cumulus (puffy/cotton-ball/cauliflower)
 - stratocumulus
 - nimbostratus
- 2) Middle-level (bases 7000-20,000 ft AGL):
 - Alto-stratus
 - Alto-cumulus
- 3) High-level (bases above 20,000 ft AGL):
 - Cirrus
 - Cirrostratus
 - Cirrocumulus
- 4) Cumulonimbus (thunderstorm) (bases can range from 2000 to 15,000 ft AGL).

Additionally, there are two other special clouds which many of you have seen in your life.

Mammatus (mammatocumulus) - is a cellular pattern of pouches (rounded bumps) extending downward from the anvil top of a very active thunderstorm/cumulonimbus in latter stages of development. Mammatus occurs when air from the cloud layer descends into the clear air below and the cloud droplets evaporate, cooling down the air and making it descend even faster. Some of the cloud is dragged down, creating the pouch appearance. They typically are at an altitude of 20,000 to 50,000 ft AGL. They can be very scary-looking to some folks. However, they are not tornadoes, nor do they lead to or develop into a tornado.



Lenticular clouds - Lenticular, or lee wave or mountain clouds, form over and downwind of an obstacle in the path of a strong air current. Wind blows most types of clouds across the sky, but lenticular clouds seem to stay in one place. Air moves up and over a mountain, with the lenticular cloud forming over or just past the mountaintop. The cloud evaporates on the downwind side where the air currents descend and warm, so it appears stationary even though air is moving through the cloud. Lenticular clouds are lens-shaped and often look like flying saucers.

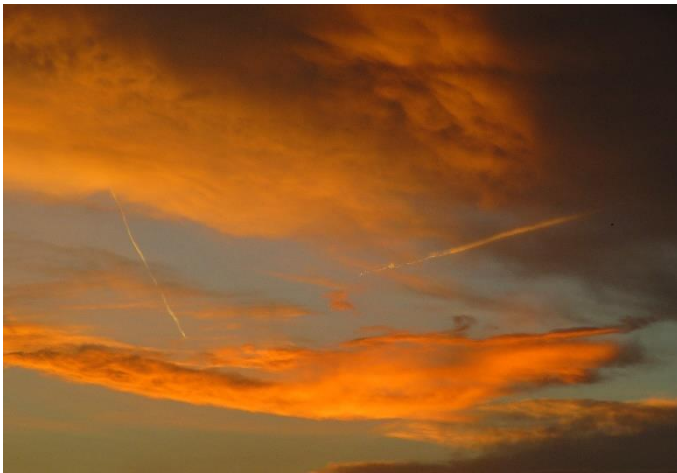
This heron has been feeding behind Olive's house this afternoon (July 30th). So nice to see them now and then!

While riding my bike along the pond behind Hans and Carla's place I spotted some interesting bluegill behavior. Conditions were just right giving me the opportunity to get some decent pictures.
