GARDEN SIGN-UP

It is time to start thinking about gardening this year. Hans Hahn arranged for manure to be delivered for our garden last fall. Bob Aulik and Bob Behrens spread the manure. Sometime near the middle of May the garden will be rototilled. I will then lay off the plots, and we can start planting. When the garden starts producing, the gardeners often leave excess produce on the bench outside the fence near the shed. Produce left on the bench is available to anyone who wants it.

Garden plots are 6 feet by 25 feet for a half row, and 6 feet by 50 feet for a full row. It is also possible to get just a quarter of a row. Last year the requests and the ground came out even. We have more people that have moved in. If requests are greater than supply, the full rows will be allocated by lottery. Everyone who wants a plot should get a plot.


U.S. landed unmanned Odysseus spacecraft on the Moon!

On February 22, 2024, the Intuitive Machines Odysseus lunar lander was the first American spacecraft to land on the moon since Apollo 17 did so more than 50 years ago (1972)!

Key Points:

- It was the first private spacecraft ever to make a soft landing there (near Moon's South Pole).
- It carried 6 NASA scientific instruments, an EagleCam for outside selfies and a part for a future telescope.
- The spacecraft is 14 feet tall, 5 feet wide and has 6 landing legs. With fuel it weighed 4200 pounds.
- It was launched by a SpaceX Falcon 9 rocket.

Let's talk about our Moon!

Key Points:

- Today it orbits 238,900 miles away from Earth
- It would take you 5.5 months, traveling at 60 mph, to go from the Earth to the Moon
- Moon's orbit speed is 0.635 miles per second, or 2,286 miles per hour
- Moon is moving/drifting away from the Earth about 1.5 inches per year
- Same side always faces Earth (same rotational speed as Earth)
- Lunar month is 29.5 Earth days long
- Diameter is 2159 miles (1/4 of Earth)
- Mass is 1.23% of Earth's mass
- Surface gravity is 1/6 of Earth's gravity
- Escape velocity from Moon's gravity is 5,300 miles per hour
- Surface temperature ranges from -276F in the shade to +284F in sunlight
- No atmosphere or magnetic field
- Gravitational tug of Moon and Sun create 2 high tides and 2 low tides per day on Earth
- Moon was volcanically active until about 1.2 billion years ago
- About 1.4 billion years ago it was about 212,000 miles away from Earth
- About 2.46 billion years ago it was about 201,600 miles away from the Earth and the Earth-day was about 17 hours long
- Moon formed 4.51 billion years ago, shortly after Earth's birth
- Formed from debris related to collision of the Earth with a Mars-sized proto-planet (Theia)
- The presence of the Moon helps to stabilize Earth's rotation on its axis and prevent large variations in the Earth tilt axis
- There is a wobble in the Moon's orbital path. When the Moon's orbit is more in line with the Earth's equator, the tides are exaggerated, resulting in greater coastal flooding on Earth



Lunar gravity does affect the density of Earth's atmosphere, on a very small scale. When the moon is overhead the air pressure of atmosphere on the side of the Earth increases very slightly. Additionally, research suggests rainfall on that side of the Earth is about 1% lighter. These changes are imperceptible for most humans and dwarfed by other ongoing weather processes.

Ongoing research suggests the lunar-indued ocean tides we experience partially affect the movement of the ocean's warm and cold-water currents as well as influence the El Nino and La Nina cycles. Additionally, some researchers have noted a very small increase in air temperatures over the North Pole and South Pole regions when the Moon is overhead, perhaps related to more sunlight being reflected off the surface of the Moon. However, all of this research suggests any influence of the Moon on Earth's short-term (day-to-day) weather is exceedingly small.
